

Codes of Behaviour

The Spirit of the Game involves respect for:

- Your opponents
- Your own captain and team
- The role of the umpires
- The game and its traditional values

(MCC Preamble to the Laws of Cricket, para 4)

PLAYERS CODE OF BEHAVIOUR

- 1. Play by the rules and in accordance with the spirit of cricket.
- 2. Never argue with an umpire. If you disagree with a decision, have your captain, coach or manager approach the umpire during a break or after the game.
- 3. Control your temper. Verbal abuse of officials or the sledging of other players as well as deliberately distracting or provoking an opponent is not acceptable or permitted in cricket.
- 4. Work equally hard for yourself and your teammates.
- 5. Be a good sport. Applaud all good play whether by your team or the opposition.
- 6. Treat all participants in cricket as you like to be treated. Do not bully or take unfair advantage of another competitor.
- 7. Cooperate with your coach, teammates and opponents.
- 8. Participate for your own enjoyment and benefit, not just to please parents and coaches.
- 9. Respect the rights, dignity and worth of every young person regardless of his or her gender, ability, cultural background or religion.
- 10. Play the game for the game's sake. It should be enjoyable for your teammates, the opposition, the officials and the spectators, as well as you.

PARENTS CODE OF BEHAVIOUR

- 1. Do not force an unwilling child to participate in cricket.
- 2. Remember that children are involved in cricket for their enjoyment, not yours.
- 3. Encourage your child to play by the rules and in accordance with the spirit of cricket.
- 4. Focus on the team's efforts and performance rather than winning or losing.
- 5. Never ridicule or yell at a child for making a mistake or losing a game.
- 6. Remember that children learn best by example. Appreciate good play by all participants.
- 7. Support all efforts to remove verbal and physical abuse from sporting activities.
- 8. Respect officials' decisions and teach children to do likewise.
- 9. Show appreciation for volunteer coaches, officials and administrators.
- 10. Respect the rights, dignity and worth of every young person regardless of his or her gender, ability, cultural background or religion

COACHES CODE OF BEHAVIOUR

- 1. Remember that young people participate for pleasure and winning is only part of the fun.
- 2. Never ridicule or yell at a young player for making a mistake or not coming first.
- 3. Be reasonable in your demands on players' time, energy and enthusiasm.
- 4. Operate within the rules and the spirit of cricket and teach your players to do the same.
- 5. Ensure that the time players spend with you is a positive experience.
- 6. Avoid overplaying the talented players; all young players need and deserve equal time, attention and opportunities.
- 7. Ensure that equipment and facilities meet safety standards and are appropriate to the age and ability of all players.
- 8. Display control and respect to all those involved in cricket. This includes opponents, coaches, umpires, administrators, parents and spectators. Encourage your players to do the same.
- 9. Obtain appropriate qualifications and keep up to date with the latest cricket coaching practices and principles of growth and development of young people.
- 10. Respect the rights, dignity and worth of every young person regardless of his or her gender, ability, cultural background or religion.

UMPIRES CODE OF BEHAVIOUR

- 1. Place the safety and welfare of participants above all else.
- 2. Compliment and encourage all participants.
- 3. Be consistent, objective and courteous when making decisions.
- 4. Condemn unsporting behaviour and promote respect for all opponents.
- 5. Emphasise the spirit of the game rather than the errors.
